France's prestigious Cadre Noir presented Bettina Drummond with the rank of honorary écuyer, making her only the second American to receive such an honor — the other is **George** Morris. She's also only the second woman to receive such an honor from the Cadre Noir; The first was French Olympic dressage rider Margit Otto-Crépin. In presenting her with a golden whip and "honorary écuyer" rank, the Cadre Noir cited not only her skill and talent as a rider and trainer but also her years of dedication in promoting the French system of classical riding. Bettina trains horses and coaches riders from her base in Washington, Connecticut, and also serves as the founder of and guiding force for the Association for the Promotion of the Art of Horsemanship in America (APAHA), an organization dedicated to supporting educational opportunities that advance horsemanship as an art form in the U.S.

Lyndi knew that finding a replacement in two weeks would be tough. The horse had to be black, quiet but still game to make the charge across the field to engage the 50,000-plus football fans. A replacement was found in Cody (Skip Cody Jay), a retired roping horse that belonged to a colleague's grandparents, Jim and Mavis Jennings from Amarillo, Texas.

"He felt like Fearless Champion; he had similar buttons, he was well-trained, and, above all, he was quiet," Lyndi said. "So that was on a Friday, and I rode him all weekend and then we took him to see the band that week because the football game would be that Saturday." Cody passed his audition with the band and the pair has performed at all six home games in the Jones AT&T Stadium to the cheers of the Texas Tech fans.
