North American Youth Championships

Local jumping and dressage pairs make their cross-country trips to international championships worthwhile.

It all came down to the last round, but the Canadian team clinched victory in the USHJA North American Young Rider Show Jumping Team Championship at the Adequan® FEI North American Youth Championships, presented by Gotham North, at Old Salem Farm in North Salem, NY on August 2. The Championships were held July 30-August 4 and included both dressage and jumping. (The eventing counterpart was staged during The Event at Rebecca Farm in late July. See story, page 36.)

The USHJA Zone 10 team of Natalie Dean, 20, of Palo Alto, riding Marigold Sporhorses LLC and her own Don's Diamant, an 11-year-old KWPN stallion; Emma Catherine Reichow, 17, from Menlo Park, on her own Forever Alve, a 9-year-old KWPN mare; Cate Tomlinson, 18, of Palo Alto, riding her own Hawai van Paemel, a 12-year-old Belgian Warmblood mare: and Alessandra Volpi, 19, of Woodside, and her own Foster, an 11-year-old Hanoverian gelding, earned the silver with 22.49 faults.

Earlier that same day, Mexico won the USHJA

North American Junior Rider Show Jumping Team Championship, while the USHJA Zone 4/10 team earned gold medals in the USHJA North American Children's Rider Show Jumping Team Championship.

Natalie Dean and Don's Diamant excelled throughout the long week of high stakes Young Rider courses, including a bronze medal finish in the individual final. As one of the top two U.S. riders on the podium, Natalie will be considered for the opportunity to qualify for the U.S. Jumping Youth Team for the FEI Youth Nations Cup Final. The individual was won by Sophie Gochman, New York, of Zone 2. Reserve went to Canada's Sam Walker.

Zone 10's Emma Catherine Reichow and Forever Alve were 4th and Alessandra Volpi and Foster were 6th. Ty Simpson stayed in the ribbons with a 12th place finish with Quality Iris.

In the Junior team division, Clea Caddell, Parker Cliff and Amelia Enzminger finished 7th.

Childrens: Two West Coast riders from Zone 10 in their first NAYC appearance joined the Zone 4 pair to earn gold in this division. Sahana Ganesan, 14, from Portola Valley, rode her own Chachas Fire to scores of 1 and 5 faults. "It's amazing to be able to compete with all the competitors here, even though we're from different parts of the continent," Ganesan said. "Everyone here is so nice. It's such an honor to get to compete with riders of this caliber at our age. It was so easy becoming a team because everyone here is so welcoming. It's an opportunity to learn how to ride under pressure and to meet lots of new people in the industry."

William MacLean, 14, traveled from Reno, NV, for the NAYC with his own Poli Loli L, a 12-year-old Polish Warmblood mare, and turned in scores of 12 and 4 in the two rounds for the team result. "I think we had two really good rounds. The second round was an improvement from the first round, which was really important to me," said MacLean. "I've had Poli Loli for a year. The person who rode her before me was doing the 1.35m on the rand she took me from the 1.10m all the way to the 1.30m and 1.35m. Before I had her, I really only did the hunters and the [equitation], so she's been awesome at bringing me in to the jumper world."

The riders from opposite coasts didn't know they'd be joining forces until just before the NAYC competition began, but they enjoyed the opportunity to get to know each other. "I liked that we were from two different parts [of the country] because I've never been able to compete with Will and Sahana, and now I have two new friends," said Zone 4 rider Mia Albelo, 14, from Miami, FL "If I go to California, I have two friends there! We really bonded and it was a super cool experience." The combined team's fourth member was Chapin Cheska, of Wellington, FL.

USHJA Zone 2 earned the silver rung on the winners podium and Canada was bronze.



Dressage

USDF Region 7 sent a small team to the Championships, but they represented the region very well. Katherine Mathews and Soliere finished the Individual Young Riders in 6th place with a 67.088. And joining with three pairs from Region 7, Katherine helped the combined team to a 6th place finish.

On the Junior card, Dennesy Rogers and Chanel were reserve champs in the individual championships with a 70.206%, then they danced to 3rd on the final day's Freestyle competition with a 71.250.

A top honor went to Region 7 coach Alison Burt-Jacobs, who received the Albers Award, named in honor of the long time Region 1 chef d'equipe, Patty Albers. The quantity and quality of Alison's commitment to Region 7 young riders is much appreciated by all.
